Goal of this meeting: Identify the PER community's needs and desires regarding PERLOC activities. What do you want us to do for you all?

In order to inform your thinking on this topic, here is a review of some of PERLOC's activities in the past year:

Ongoing

- We awarded conference scholarships to a number of individuals who showed both financial need and promise of scholarly contributions to the PER community. We will award scholarships every year.
- 2. We awarded three "mini-grants" on the order of \$2500 each to fund projects benefiting the PER community. The "mini-grants" model allows us to respond to the community's needs and interests rather than deciding in advance what those must be. This year's awardees:

- preparing issue of Reviews in PER on comPADRE focusing on upper division issues
- 3. We will **subsidize page charges for** *PRST-PER* up to \$3000/year, should AAPT subsidies be inadequate.
- 4. We continue to work with AAPT to form a meaningful and reliable relationship with the AAPT leadership. We have a regular place on the Executive Board agenda to make the board aware of matters of interest to PERTG. We do not have formal representation on the Executive Board.
- 5. We (mostly Noah) selected **PERC 2011** organizers, oversaw their planning, provided continuity, assisted organizers in coordinating with past organizers and with AAPT, and facilitated improvement of logistical details such as registration options. PERC 2011 will be organized by **David Brookes**, **Brian Frank**, **Elizabeth Gire**, **Matty Lau**, and **Noah Podolefsky**. The theme is **Frontiers in Assessment**: **Instrumentation**, **Goals and Practices**.
